The college welcomes students with Autism and Asperger's Syndrome

Abingdon & Witney College is committed to inclusive learning. The aim of our support service is to cater for the individual needs of students. If you have any special requirements to enable you to access education or other provision at the college, please contact our Student Advisor Team on 01235 21 6440.

What help is available?

A specialist team, called the Further Education Autism Specialist Team (FEAST) from the Oxfordshire County Council Service for Autism, is available at the college to ensure that students with Autism and Asperger's Syndrome succeed socially and in their course of study.

We know that visiting college for the first time can be a source of anxiety for many students with Autism and Asperger's Syndrome so you will be welcomed by one of our Learner Support Advisors and a member of FEAST.

These members of staff will be able to answer your questions regarding the course you would like to do and what support is available.

Where can I find information and advice about the college opportunities available to me?

What type of support does FEAST provide?

FEAST offer targeted support in classes to help you overcome your particular difficulty, for example, organising work and helping to deal with sensory or anxiety/emotional issues. Along with this, FEAST will help with coursework and assignments.

On the college site we have what is called a "Green Room" equipped with computers for you to work. This is a quiet social space for use exclusively by students with AS and ASD throughout the day and is a lovely place for students to chill.

FEAST can offer 1:1 study support and mentoring sessions alongside any other support you are already getting.

FEAST also provide autism-awareness training and support and guidance for college staff.

FEAST and the college monitor your progress, celebrate your successes and assist with any difficulties you might have, as well as liaising regularly with your tutors.

How do I access support?

You'll be able to access the support on offer if you have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), or you have a diagnosis of ASD/are seeking one.

When filling out an application form for a college course, you need to tick the "yes" box under "physical medical conditions or sensory impairment". This will then alert FEAST and the college staff who will get in touch with you. Support will depend on your level of need and will be assessed against our Service's criteria for involvement.

FEAST and college support staff will discuss with you what sort of support you need and how much.

What help can I get with exams and assessments?

Arrangements may be made for extra time, additional breaks, separate rooms, a scribe or use of specialist equipment if this is appropriate for you and if we can show supporting evidence of need.
